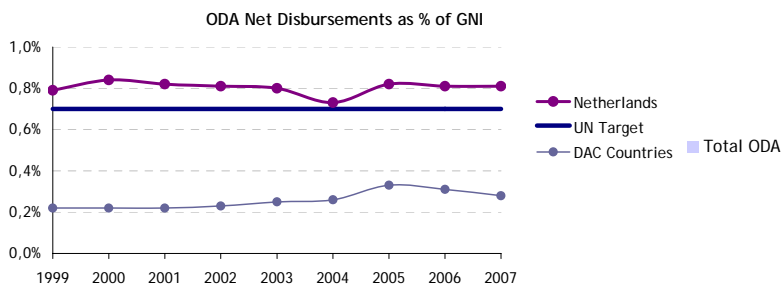
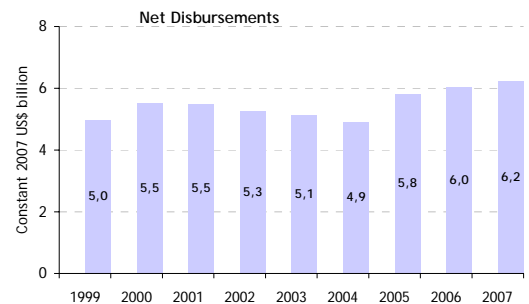


Overview of Dutch aid to education 1999-2007

Total ODA



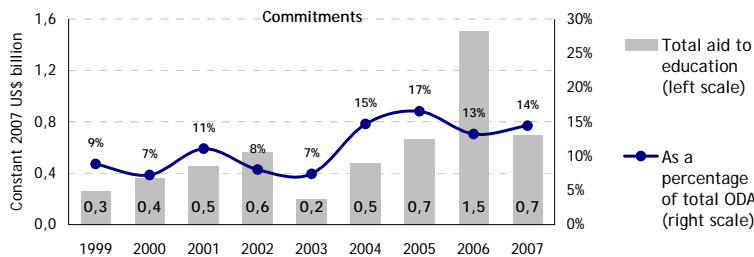
ODA as percentage of GNI increased since 1999 and remained above the 0.7% target.



Total ODA increased by 2,5% a year.

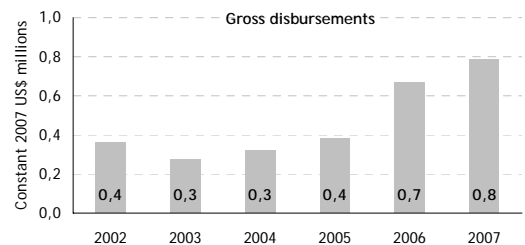
Dutch aid to education

Commitments:

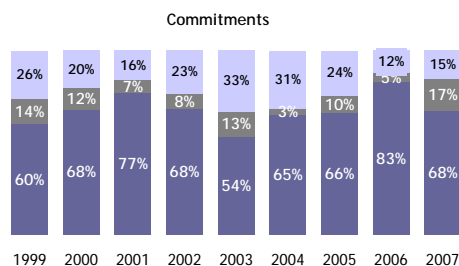
Total aid to education increased by 11,6% a year.



Disbursements:

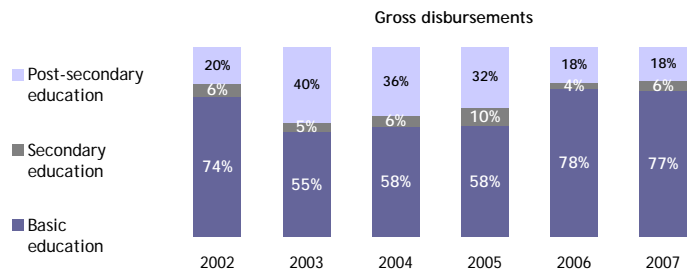
Total aid to education increased by 14% a year.

In 2007, basic education received on average about 68 % of Dutch aid to education.

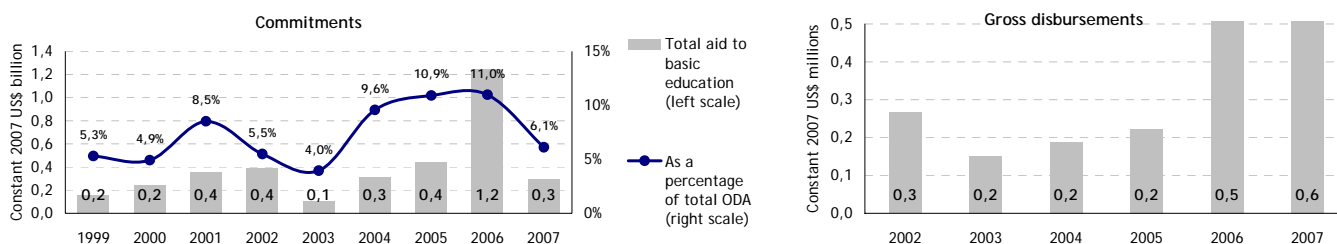


Disbursements:

► Total aid to basic education, change since Dakar



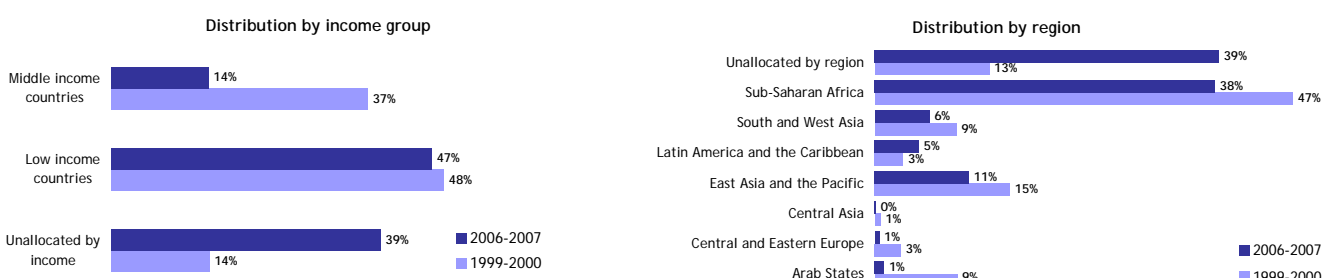
Commitments:

Total aid to basic education increased by 7,4% a year.

Disbursements:

Total aid to basic education increased by 14,7% a year.

► Distribution of aid to basic education by income groups and regions (commitments)



In 2006 and 2007, low income countries received 47% of Dutch aid to basic education.

The share of these countries in Dutch aid to basic education decreased by 2 percentage points since Dakar.

In 2006 and 2007, Sub-Saharan Africa and South and West Asia countries received respectively 38% and 6% of Dutch aid to basic education.

About the data

These analyses were developed by the Education for All Global Monitoring Report team in April 2009. They are based on data from the OECD-DAC On-line Database on Annual Aggregates and the Creditor Reporting System (CRS) On-line Database on Aid Activities. All data are expressed in Constant 2007 US\$.

Difference between commitments and disbursements:

- Commitment is a firm obligation by a donor to provide specified assistance to a country or multilateral organization.
- Disbursements record the actual international transfer of financial resources or of goods or services valued by the donor.
- As the aid committed in a given year can be disbursed later, sometimes over several years, the annual aid figures based on commitments are not comparable to those based on disbursements.
