## International Conference Media and Information Literacy for Knowledge Societies 24-28 June, 2012, Moscow, Russian Federation

### Overview

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Today, information and knowledge are commonly recognized as strategic resources for societal, economic, political, educational, technological and cultural development in the countries around the world. During the last few decades, the radical technological, political and economic transformations have provided not only faster access to information and knowledge, but also created new dependencies, complex situations, structures and practices among people, organizations and even entire nations. In response to the converging issues and emerging challenges, a number of new concepts, approaches, structures, standards, strategies and tools have been proposed. Among them, knowledge societies is one of the notions introduced to describe a new vision of societies that highlights the importance of the principles of openness, pluralism, inclusion, and participation. The concept is composed of building blocks such as education, cultural diversity, access to information and freedom of expression.

In order to succeed in a constantly changing environment, people, communities and nations need to become self-motivated, self-directed and self-acting throughout their life time. This enables them to make informed decisions and to resolve problems effectively in every facet of life – personal, social, educational and professional. For this reason, individuals, communities and nations need information about themselves as well as their physical and social environments. Likewise, they require to understand why and how various information providers create and disseminate information, and what are their functions, roles and impact in society. It is also important to know how to use tools effectively such as Information and Communication Technologies (ICTs). Altogether, people, communities and nations should obtain a critical set of competencies to be able to seek information, critically evaluate and create new information and knowledge in different forms using existing tools such as ICTs, and share it through various channels. All those information and communication related competences are integrated in the concept of *Media and Information Literacy*.

Media and Information Literacy (MIL) consists of knowledge, attitudes, and the sum of the skills necessary to know when and what information is needed; where and how to obtain that information; how to evaluate it critically and organise it once it is found; and how to use and share it in an ethical and effective way. MIL also emphasizes the ability to understand the functions of media and information systems, as well as evaluate how those functions are performed and to rationally engage with media and information systems for self-expression. The concept extends beyond communication and information technologies to encompass learning, critical thinking, and interpretative skills, across and beyond professional and educational boundaries throughout life. On the one hand, MIL includes all types of information resources: oral, print, and digital. On the other side, it is also closely linked to other types of overlapping literacies such as computer literacy, digital literacy or cultural literacy.

As formulated in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights several decades ago, freedom of expression and right to information are basic human rights that remain equally relevant in an increasingly digital, interdependent, and global world, as they promote greater social inclusion, pluralism, openness and participation. The recognition and understanding of these rights and values will contribute to bridging the gap between the information rich and the information poor. MIL empowers and endows individuals with knowledge about (a) the functions of the media and information systems in democratic societies, (b) the conditions necessary to perform these functions, and (c) how to critically evaluate the content and services they provide. It assists them and their institutions and organisations to meet their technological, economic, and social challenges, to redress disadvantages, and to advance every individual's well-being.

The mainstreaming, application and advocacy of media and information literacy at different levels should not be seen as one of the challenges for building inclusive knowledge societies, but rather as a unique opportunity. Professional development and training for living in the new reality does not keep pace with the rate of technical development and social changes. For this reason, it is becoming more and more vital to provide citizens with the necessary education and training to be able to live and work successfully in very complicated information and knowledge oriented environment. Individuals need to know how to act to this constantly changing environment, efficiently use its potential and protect themselves from its negative impacts. Media and information literacy is a prerequisite for exercising constitutional rights and participating in societal and personal development, particularly in quality education. It is also equally important to develop tools and resources for assessment and capacity building of Media and Information Literacy at various societal levels. This will help to make informed and strategic decisions as well as allocate necessary resources at political, economic and societal levels.

Media and information literacy (MIL) is essential for observing ethical principles and professional standards in knowledge societies. Professional communities such as publishers, librarians, educators, journalists and other information and media specialists, are directly involved in creating, distributing, using and preserving information and knowledge. The need for developing media and information literacy skills, knowledge and attitudes, especially of young citizens and other marginalized social groups, is even more critical in the light of the rapid depreciation of knowledge due to the change of scientific, technological and social paradigms.

Media and information literacy is directly linked to UNESCO's mandate and strategic objectives oriented to build inclusive knowledge societies. The Information Literacy development is one of the priorities of the Strategic Plan of the UNESCO Information for All Programme (IFAP) and media literacy bears relevance to the UNESCO International Programme for the Development of Communication (IPDC). Moreover, MIL is also essential in reaching Dakar Education for All (EFA) and Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). MIL contributes to the implementation of the WSIS Declaration of Principles and Plan of Action (2003 and 2005) and was also articulated in the Grünwald (1982), Prague (2003), Alexandria (2005) and Fez (2010) Declarations. The international conference in Moscow is held under the framework of the Russian chairmanship in the IFAP Intergovernmental Council and is Russia's contribution to the implementation of the Programme's Strategic Plan.
