

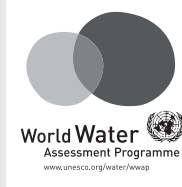

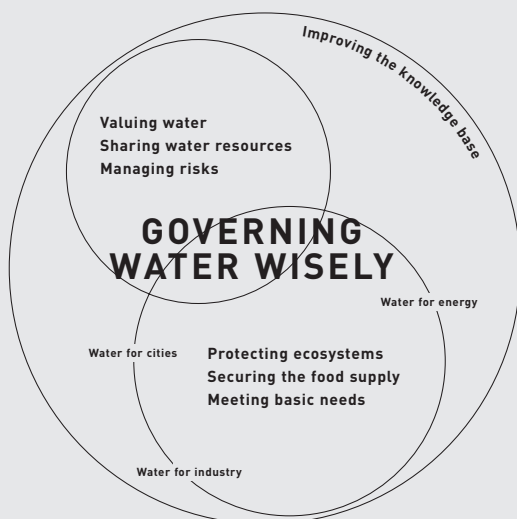

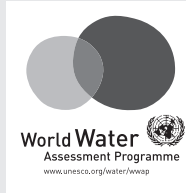
Our mission:

The *World Water Development Report* (WWDR) is taking up the seven challenge areas identified by the Hague Ministerial Declaration (2000):

- Meeting basic needs.
- Securing the food supply.
- Protecting the environment.
- Sharing water resources.
- Managing risks.
- Valuing water.
- Governing water wisely.

To which four additional challenges have been added:

- Water for industry.
- Water for energy.
- Ensuring the knowledge base.
- Water for cities.

The first *World Water Development Report*, to be published in March 2003, will:

- Review progress and trends since the Rio Earth Summit, 1992.
- Present case studies of water-related stress in river basins, aquifers, cities and countries.
- Assess progress in meeting the 11 challenges.
- Examine the need, availability and uses of water resources.
- Propose methodologies and indicators for measuring sustainability.
- Document lessons learned for understanding and evaluating how societies cope with water-related stress.
- Expand the knowledge base by encouraging UN agencies, local partners and other players to exchange data and information.
