Mrs Agrippina Shin, Minister of Preschool Education, Republic of Uzbekistan



Regional group I:






Dr. Muhammad Hasbi, Director of Early Childhood Education, Ministry of Education, Culture, Research and Technology, Indonesia

Ms Christin Macconnel, Education Specialist, Global Partnership for Education (GPE)


