The 1954 Convention for the Protection of Cultural Property in the Event of Armed Conflict was the first international legal framework entirely dedicated to the protection of movable and immovable heritage, setting a precedent for the preservation of heritage in international humanitarian law. Seven decades on, the Convention has steadily gained a global significance, having been ratified by 135 States Parties.

Protecting cultural property, whether during peacetime or an armed conflict, means safeguarding the memories of peoples and societies, and passing down the diverse fabric of humanity to the generations to come. Instruments such as the 1954 Convention contribute to building and cementing a foundation of peace.

The major UNESCO International Conference in The Hague will bring together diverse stakeholders involved in the protection of cultural property, to take stock of the achievements, challenges and lessons learned in the pursuit of culture for all - regardless of who they are, where they may be.
